WHEN TAXI FARE IS MORE THAN JUST A RIDE

Juanita and her daughters are survivors of narcissistic abuse and domestic violence, and all three suffer from chronic health issues.

In the fall of 2023, the family secured a spot in government housing, but the location is a long and complicated bus ride away from the school that her daughters have grown to love. As the weather turned colder, the daily journey became unbearable.

Changing schools this year was not a viable option. Juanita says her daughters' school, and the friends they have made there, has been the girls' sanctuary, their therapy, and their solace from the anxiety they continue to endure as a result of their family circumstances.

Funds from HLF are subsidizing private transportation to school this winter, so the girls can continue learning in an environment that is helping them flourish.





SCHOOL GRANTS

School grants provided through HLF in 2022-2023 supported 121 programs at 56 schools across the Halton District School Board. These programs reflect the following priorities of the HDSB's multi-year plan: equity and inclusion; learning and achievement; mental health and wellbeing; and Indigenous awareness.
